## **What this product is:**

- Interdisciplinary, full-text index
- provides access to magazine, journal and newspaper literature.
- 373 titles indexed; all come from various ethnic news resources.
- Groups covered: African American/Caribbean; Latinos/Chicanos; Asians/Pacific Islanders; Jewish; Arab/Middle Eastern; Native American; European/Eastern European.
- Coverage is from 1959 to the present:
- Bilingual

## **Why use this product?**

- It indexes publications not readily available in other sources
- Covers issues from various ethnic perspectives which can often be different from perspectives found in the mainstream press.
- It's Fulltext.
- It indexes topics not covered elsewhere.
- Contains primary documents. (early news about Malcolm X, for example).
- Sample topics covered: Environmental justice, American History, Civil rights, social movements, immigration, borderlands studies, archaeology, the arts, American Indian Movement, social movements, cultural property, Chicano Studies, Aztlan, Mexican music.

**Caution: Do not limit yourself to just this product, as it covers a limited number of publications, but use it in conjunction with other products.**

**Searching known items vs. unknown items.**

- Free text vs. controlled vocabulary:
- Free text: use any terms. Sometimes students will not know which words are used to describe an ethnic group: Chicano/Mexican American/Latino/Hispanic or Black/African American/Afro American etc.
- Controlled vocabulary: subject headings.
- Phrase searching
- Searching a person: last name first, followed by a comma works fine.

**Refining a search:**

- By ethnic group
- By subject
- By language
- By publication

**Cool features:**

- Sort by date. Use Malcolm X as an example.
- Translating articles
- Exporting your citations to Refworks or other products like Endnote.
- Getting help
