

CITY OF TUCSON OFFICE OF THE MAYOR **PROCLAMATION**

WHEREAS, 1994 marks the 25th Anniversary of the June 1969 events known as the Stonewall Rebellion in New York City marking the opposition of harassment of Gays and Lesbians: and

WHEREAS, the Gay and Lesbian community remember at this time of year the many homosexuals put to death in Nazi concentration camps during World War II; and

WHEREAS, in February 1977, the Tucson City Council, recognizing the discrimination suffered by Gay and Lesbian individuals, passed by unanimous vote an amendment to the Human Relations Ordinance banning discrimination in employment, housing and public accommodations based on sexual or affectional preference; and

WHEREAS, "Stonewall 25 - A Global Celebration of Pride" has been chosen as the theme for 1994 giving all Tucsonans an opportunity to increase our understanding and awareness of the importance of eliminating harassment of others based on sexual orientation; and

WHEREAS, all persons, regardless of sexual orientation, are entitled equally to all freedoms under the law,

NOW, THEREFORE, I, George Miller, Mayor of the City of Tucson, Arizona, do hereby proclaim June 12-19, 1994, to be

LESBIAN AND GAY PRIDE WEEK

in this community, and urge all of our citizens to support the freedom shared by all.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the City of Tucson to be affixed this 13th day of June 1994.



The History of the Stonewall Rebellion

During the last weekend of June of 1969, police and Alcoholic Beverage Control Board agents entered a gay bar — **The Stonewall Inn**, on Christopher Street, in New York City. Allegedly they were there to look for violations of the alcohol control laws. They made the usual homophobic comments and then, after checking identification, threw the patrons out of the bar, one by one. But, instead of quietly slipping away into the night as we had done for years... hustlers, drag queens, students and other patrons held their ground and fought back. Someone uprooted a parking meter and used it to barricade the door. The agents and police were trapped inside. They wrecked the place and called in reinforcements. Authority vehicles raced to the scene with lights glaring and sirens blasting. The crowd grew. Someone set a fire. More people came. For three days, people protested. And for the first time, after innumerable years of oppression, the chant "**Gay Power**" rang out.

This event has taken on mythic significance. Many organizations proudly use Stonewall or Christopher Street in their names.

During the summer and autumn of 1969, five Gay Liberation Fronts sprang up — in New York, Berkeley, Los Angeles, San Francisco and San Jose. By the end of 1970, three hundred Gay Liberation Fronts had been created.

The first demonstration in commemoration of the Stonewall Rebellion was held in New York in August of 1969. Marches were held in 1970 in New York and Los Angeles on the anniversary of the Uprising — and a tradition was born. Since then, annual marches have been held in many cities in the US and in other countries. For many of us, we drew our strength from these events and from those around us. We felt pride in our community.

On October 12, 1985, at the annual conference of the International Association of Lesbian and Gay Pride Coordinators, Morris Knight, a member of the Christopher Street West/Los Angeles delegation, proposed that the 25th anniversary of the Stonewall Uprising be observed with the first International Lesbian/Gay Pride Celebration. He proposed a massive presence of our international community in New York during June of 1994.

Since then, the developing concept of **Stonewall 25** was met with enthusiasm at Pride Coordinator conferences in Vancouver, Minneapolis and Boston, and at International Lesbian and Gay Association (ILGA) conferences in Stockholm and in Paris, where delegates discussed and formulated the name and demands of the International March.

A goal was set to strive for gender parity and 50% representation of People of Color on all decision making bodies. We also committed to adequate representation of the disabled, bisexuals, seniors, youth — indeed, the entirety of the grand mosaic that comprises our community.

The results were overwhelming. Besides the International March and Rally, a vast array of activities including Gay Games IV, the annual ILGA conference, the Stonewall History Project, a mass concert by the Lesbian/Gay Bands of America, and a mass worship service organized by the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches. There were athletic, cultural, educational, health-related, political and religious/spiritual/humanist events organized and participated in by lesbian/gay/bisexual community members from all around the world.

It's a long way from June 1969... and we still have a long way to go.

A GLIMPSE AT OUR HISTORY — TUCSON STYLE —

Tucson has a long and strong Gay & Lesbian history. The Community has been in strong evidence here from the 1940's and even earlier. We have had lots of events, lots of bars and businesses, lots of news worthy accomplishments. Due to limited time and resources we have only been able to compile this random glimpse beginning in 1965. Next year we hope to complete the past history years and hope that you can add a few names, places and dates we may have missed. This is in no way everything. We hope we didn't leave out your most special event. If we did it was not because of anything other than exhaustion. We have a long history... this is just to tickle your memory banks.



1965

Jim's, located at 23 W. University opened in 1965 by Jim O'Malley & George Rederus. In 1969 it was renamed Kamu's and became "straight" until 1970 when Don Nelson bought and renamed it for the last time, The Graduate.

1976

- April 1976, Tucson Gay Coalition founded. The only other gay groups at this time were MCC and GSO (Gay Student Organization) at UA.
- June 6, 197 21 year old Richard Heakin, a visitor from Lincoln, Nebraska was fatally beaten as he was leaving the Stonewall bar. Four high school students were arrested and convicted of involuntary manslaughter, due to their age.
- In response to Heakin's murder, two police liaisons were assigned to the gay community. They made regular rounds to all the gay bars.
- · Buff Fisher becomes Pastor of MCC.
- Imperial Court of Tucson is inaugurated as Empress I Cicely is crowned at Jekyll & Hydes.
- Stonewall holds 4th Anniversary celebration.
- Bookland (owners, Heimbuch and Bunting), opens on Speedway carrying gay literature.
- 2nd Annual Hayride Through Winterhaven sponsored by Stonewall.
- Lucky Pierre's cocktail prices at happy hour: 40¢ WELL, 40¢ BOTTLE BEER, 25¢ DRAFT.
- H & L Bar opens, 1906 S. Craycroft.



1977

- Grand opening of the Hair Tiz (although it had been operating for a few months before).
- · Stonewall closes but Backpocket stavs open.

- First issue of the Arizona Gay News in tabloid form.
- Fernando Ochoa crowned Emperor I of the Empire of Tucson. He was crowned at Jekyll's.
- The Tucson Gay Coalition spearheads a drive to ban discrimination in employment, housing and public accommodations. Tucson City Council passes the amendment to the Human Rights Ordinance unanimously.
- · Lucky Pierre's closes its doors.
- Old Stonewall changes its name to the Joshua Tree and reopens at the same location.
- First VD clinic opens at GCS (Gay Community Services) in conjunction with PCHD.
- A gay film forum was held at Rincon High School by the Tucson Public Library and was funded by the AZ. Council on the Humanities.



- TLGPC, Tucson Lesbian Gay Pride Committee, formed as an outgrowth of the Lesbian and Gay Pride Week Committee, who only sponsored the Pride Picnic.
- · Tucson woman fired for refusing to sell Penthouse.
- Three Tucsonans named in the Advocate 400. They are Bob Ellis, Bill North, and Bruce Fowler.
- · Local monsoons rip the roof off the Fineline.
- · OPBPA begins first Tucson business association.
- TLGPC host 1st Annual Twinkle Ball at the Santa Rita Hotel.
- Joshua Tree/Back Pocket hosts their 8th Annual Hayride Through Winterhaven.
- TLGPC forms a law enforcement subcommittee to act as liaison with TPD—acts of harassment have been occurring.
- Tom and Mac buy Rita's Rendezvous from Rita and Vinny
- Dignity/Tucson does a major educational campaign with counselors who deal with lesbian and gay clientele
- Tucson's YWCA offers "Women Helping Women" workshops
- First Mr. Leatherman chosen in Tucson Jay Cunningham
- · Holly Near and Ronny Gilbert in Tucson for concert
- TLGPC and Tucson's law enforcement agencies agree to cooperate to stop discrimination in Tucson
- Arizona Gay Bar Owners Association holds "Octoberfest 84" as a fund-raiser for the newly formed AAFT
